IT'S NOT TOO LATE... TO BE THANKFUL -- Season of Hope (1 of 4) Key Scriptures: Ephesians 2:1-10. Luke 23:26-43

Main Theme: True thankfulness is grounded in recognizing God's grace, mercy, and transformative power in our lives. As we reflect on what He has done, we find hope for today and eternity.

1. I'M GRATEFUL TO GOD FOR THE GRACE AND MERCY THAT HE'S SHOWN TO ME

- Ephesians 2:1-5: "But God, being rich in mercy, because of His great love... made us alive together with Christ—by grace, you have been saved."
 - We were spiritually dead, but God extended unmerited favor and mercy.
 - Grace reminds us we don't earn salvation; it's a gift!
 - Application: Reflect on specific moments when you've seen God's grace in your life.
- Luke 23:43: Jesus tells the thief on the cross, "Today, you will be with me in paradise."
 - A reminder that grace is always available, even in our darkest moments.

2. I'M THANKFUL TO GOD FOR THE PLAN HE HAS FOR ME

- Ephesians 2:10: "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand."
 - God's plan for us includes redemption, purpose, and hope.
 - Life isn't random; He is working everything for good.
 - Illustration: Share a personal or biblical story (e.g., Joseph) where God's plan was revealed over time.
- Jeremiah 29:11 (supporting verse): "For I know the plans I have for you..."

3. I'M GRATEFUL FOR THE HOME HE'S PREPARED FOR ME IN HEAVEN

- John 14:2-3: "In my Father's house are many rooms..."
 - Jesus' sacrifice ensures a place for us in eternity.
 - Luke 23:43 (again): The thief on the cross is promised a place in paradise.
 - Application: How does the assurance of heaven change how we live today?

4. I'M THANKFUL TO GOD FOR THE CHANGES HE'S MAKING IN ME

- Ephesians 2:8-10: "By grace you have been saved... so that no one may boast."
- Salvation is not just a one-time event; it's an ongoing transformation.
 - God's Spirit is continually at work, making us more like Christ.
- **Example:** Share a testimony or a biblical character (e.g., Peter) who was transformed by God's grace.
- **Philippians 1:6** (supporting verse): "He who began a good work in you will bring it to completion."

Reflecting Thought:

Thankfulness grows when we reflect on what God has done, is doing, and will do in our lives. Let this Thanksgiving season remind us that it's never too late to be grateful for His grace, His plans, our eternal home, and His ongoing work in us.

<u>Prayer:</u> "Lord, thank You for Your grace and mercy that saved me, for the plans You have for my life, for the home You've prepared for me in heaven, and for the transformation You're working in me each day. Help me to live in gratitude and share this hope with others. In Jesus' name, Amen."

"Teach me your ways, O Lord, that I may live according to your truth. Grant me purity of heart, so that I may honor you." Psalm 86:11 (NLT)

The value of learning, guiding others with clarity, and honoring God through our work beautifully aligns with trusting in the Lord while He teaches and nurtures our understanding in HIM.

1. Grace and Mercy: God's Undeserved Love

Theme: God's grace and mercy offer us forgiveness and new life, no matter our past.

- **Biblical Character:** *Paul (Saul of Tarsus)*
 - Scripture: *1 Timothy 1:15-16* "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of whom I am the worst. But for that very reason I was shown mercy..."
 - Paul, once a persecutor of Christians, became a champion of the Gospel, exemplifying the transformative power of God's grace.
- Supporting Scripture:
 - *Ephesians 2:8-9:* "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith."
 - *Luke 23:43*: Jesus' assurance to the thief on the cross, showcasing grace extended at the final moment.

2. God's Sovereign Plan: Purpose in Every Season

Theme: God's plan is good and purposeful, even when it seems unclear.

- Biblical Character: Joseph
 - Scripture: Genesis 50:20 "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good to accomplish what is now being done, the saving of many lives."
 - Joseph's journey from betrayal and slavery to leadership and reconciliation demonstrates how God's plan unfolds over time.
- Supporting Scripture:
 - Jeremiah 29:11: God's promise of plans for a hopeful future.
 - Romans 8:28: "We know that in all things God works for the good of those who love Him..."

3. Eternal Home: Assurance of Heaven

Theme: Heaven is our ultimate destination, secured by Jesus' sacrifice.

- Biblical Character: Abraham
 - Scripture: *Hebrews 11:10* "For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God."
 - Abraham lived with eternal hope, trusting God for promises he wouldn't fully see on earth.
- Supporting Scripture:
 - John 14:2-3: Jesus' promise of preparing a place for us.
 - Philippians 3:20: "But our citizenship is in heaven..."

4. Transformation: God's Ongoing Work in Us

Theme: Salvation is the start of a lifelong journey of transformation.

- Biblical Character: Peter
 - Scripture: *Luke 22:61-62; John 21:15-17* Peter's denial and subsequent restoration by Jesus illustrate how God refines and redeems us through His grace.
 - Peter went from impulsive denial to becoming the "rock" on which Christ built His church.
- Supporting Scripture:
 - *Philippians 1:6:* "He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion."
 - 2 Corinthians 5:17: "If anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come..."

5. Gratitude: A Response to God's Blessings

Theme: Thankfulness is a heart response to recognizing God's goodness in all areas of life.

- Biblical Character: David
 - Scripture: *Psalm 103:1-5* "Praise the Lord, my soul, and forget not all His benefits."
 - David's psalms overflow with gratitude for God's forgiveness, healing, and provision.
- Supporting Scripture:
 - *Colossians 3:17*: "Whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father..."
 - 1 Thessalonians 5:18: "Give thanks in all circumstances..."

Title: "It's Not Too Late: A Christmas of Grace, Purpose, and Transformation"

The hustle and bustle of the Christmas season had enveloped Claire's life like a snowstorm. Every to-do list screamed for her attention—shopping, decorating, baking. Yet, inside, she felt hollow, as if something essential was missing. The glimmer of the season seemed dulled, overtaken by guilt over past mistakes, worries about the future, and frustration with her present struggles.

<u>A Glimpse of Grace:</u> One snowy morning, Claire sat in a coffee shop, absently stirring her hot cocoa. Across the room, a young father struggled to calm his toddler. The little boy had spilled his juice and burst into tears. Instead of scolding, the father knelt down, wiped away the mess, and softly said, "It's okay, buddy. We'll clean this up together."

Claire's eyes welled up. It was such a small moment, but it mirrored something profound about God's grace. In her heart, she heard the whisper: *"That's what I do for you. No mistake is too messy for My grace."* She remembered the thief on the cross—his life of wrong choices and regrets—yet, in his final moment, he turned to Jesus. And Jesus didn't hesitate to extend grace, saying, "Today, you will be with Me in paradise"

God's grace, Claire realized, wasn't reserved for those who had it all together. It was for her—right here, right now.

<u>A Plan Unfolds:</u> Later that week, Claire joined her family for a Christmas tree hunt in the countryside. They wandered for hours, struggling to find the "perfect tree." Finally, Claire's daughter spotted a scraggly, crooked tree tucked in a corner. "Really? That one?" Claire asked skeptically.

Her daughter nodded emphatically. "It's perfect! We'll fix it up."

As they drove home, the tree tied awkwardly to the roof, Claire smiled. It reminded her of how God works. Just like they had plans for the tree, God has a plan for her life—crooked branches and all. She thought of Joseph, who endured betrayal and hardship, only to declare later, "You intended to harm me, but God intended it for good" (*Genesis 50:20*).

God's plans, she realized, often unfold in unexpected ways. What seemed broken could still be made beautiful in His hands.

<u>A Home Prepared:</u> Christmas Eve came, and Claire was in the kitchen, frosting cookies, when her son burst in. "Mom, I built us a gingerbread house!" he announced proudly. He set the lopsided creation on the table, and Claire chuckled at its imperfection. But her son's face radiated joy.

"It's for us to live in!" he exclaimed. Though it was only a child's creation, it stirred something deep in Claire. She thought of Jesus' promise: "In My Father's house are many rooms... I am going there to prepare a place for you" (*John 14:2-3*). Her son's gingerbread house reminded her of the eternal home awaiting her. It wasn't about perfection here on earth; it was about the promise of perfection with God in heaven.

Transformation in the Everyday: On Christmas morning, Claire watched her family open presents, the room filled with laughter and joy. She felt a quiet nudge: *"You are changing, Claire. My Spirit is at work in you."* She thought of Peter, who stumbled so many times but became a cornerstone of the early church. God was changing her, too—not overnight, but steadily, like snow melting to reveal the life underneath. Philippians 1:6 echoed in her mind: "He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion."

The Message of Christmas: It's Not Too Late: That afternoon, Claire took a walk through her neighborhood. Christmas lights twinkled against the fading daylight. She marveled at how light pierced through the darkness, just as Jesus did when He entered the world. It wasn't too late for her to experience joy. It wasn't too late to embrace grace, trust in God's plan, look forward to her eternal home, and allow God's transformation to continue. This Christmas, Claire knew she wasn't defined by her past or her struggles. She was defined by God's love, grace, and the hope of what He was doing in her life.

Application for Believers

This Christmas, as we juggle the demands of the season, may we pause to reflect:

- God's Grace: He wipes away every mess we make and invites us to start anew.
- God's Plan: Even when life feels crooked or uncertain, He is weaving a greater story.
- Our Eternal Home: Beyond the temporary, we have a forever promise of joy with Him.
- Transformation: Each day, God is shaping us to reflect His love and character.
- It's not too late to let this Christmas season draw you closer to Him.

Prayer: "Lord, thank You for the gift of grace that cleanses us, the plans You have for our lives, the home You've prepared for us, and the changes You are working within us. Help us to see You this Christmas season and trust in Your love and mercy. In Jesus' name, Amen."

7-Day Devotional: "It's Not Too Late: A Christmas of Grace, Purpose, and Transformation"

This devotional invites you to reflect on God's grace, purpose, and work in your life this Christmas season. Each day includes a theme, Scripture, reflection, prayer, and a challenge.

Day 1: God's Grace and Mercy

Scripture: *Ephesians 2:8-9* – "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God—not by works, so that no one can boast."

Reflection: Christmas reminds us of the greatest gift: God's grace through Jesus Christ. Like the thief on the cross, we don't earn or deserve God's love, yet He freely gives it to us. Grace wipes away our mistakes and makes us new. Are there areas where you're holding onto guilt or shame? Let God's grace meet you there. **Prayer:** Lord, thank You for the gift of Your grace. Challenge: Write down one area of your life where you need to receive God's grace. Pray and release it to Him.

Day 2: Trusting God's Plan

Scripture: *Jeremiah 29:11* – "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

Reflection: Life can feel messy and uncertain, but just as God used Joseph's trials for good, He is working in your story. His plans are greater than we can imagine. Are you struggling to trust His timing or purpose? Surrender those doubts to Him.

Prayer: Father, I trust that Your plans for me are good, even when I don't understand them. Help me to walk in faith and believe in Your purpose. Amen.

Challenge: Write down one area where you need to trust God's plan. Reflect on how He has been faithful to you in the past.

Day 3: Our Eternal Home

Scripture: *John 14:2-3* – "My Father's house has many rooms... I am going there to prepare a place for you." **Reflection:** The glories of Christmas—lights, carols, and feasts—are a glimpse of the eternal home Jesus has prepared for us. Heaven is not just a promise for the distant future but a hope that anchors us today. How does knowing you have a home with God impact the way you live?

Prayer: Jesus, thank You for preparing a place for me in heaven. Help me to live each day with the joy and hope of my eternal home. Amen.

Challenge: Spend a few moments imagining the beauty of your eternal home with God. Share this hope with someone today.

Day 4: Transformation Through God's Love

Challenge: Identify one habit or mindset you want God to transform in your life. Commit it to Him in prayer.

Day 5: Living with Gratitude

Scripture: *Psalm 103:1-2* – "Praise the Lord, my soul; all my inmost being, praise His holy name. Praise the Lord, my soul, and forget not all His benefits."

Reflection: Gratitude is a powerful way to refocus our hearts on God's goodness. David's psalms overflow with thankfulness, even in difficult times. What blessings can you thank God for today?

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for Your countless blessings. Open my eyes to see Your goodness in my life, and fill my heart with gratitude. Amen.

Challenge: Make a list of five things you're grateful for today. Share one with someone else to encourage them.

Day 6: Sharing God's Light

Scripture: *Matthew 5:16* – "Let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."

Reflection: Christmas is a time to share the light of Christ. Just as a single candle can brighten a dark room, your kindness and love can point others to God. Who in your life needs to see His light through you? **Prayer:** Jesus, help me to be a light in the darkness. Use my life to show others Your love and hope this Christmas season. Amen.

Challenge: Do one intentional act of kindness today to reflect God's love to someone in need.

Activity: List one current challenge and pray for God's wisdom and peace as you trust His plan.

Theme 3: The Promise of Eternal Home

Focus Verse: John 14:2-3 – "In My Father's house are many rooms... I go to prepare a place for you." **Biblical Example:** Abraham (Hebrews 11:8-10). He obeyed God's call to leave his home, trusting in the promise of a heavenly city.

Application: God's promise of heaven provides hope and perspective for our earthly journey. Reflect on how this hope impacts daily life.

Activity: Meditate on Revelation 21:1-4. How does this vision of heaven encourage you today?

Application: Gratitude shifts our focus from what we lack to God's abundance. Challenge participants to develop a daily habit of thanksgiving.

Activity: Keep a gratitude journal for a week, listing three things you're thankful for each day.
